Discussion Topics

1. Building & Planning Permitting Software:

Minute Notes: Chris Farnsworth discussed the software program "Civic Plus" that they chose to streamline the permitting process. It has many other software components that can be implemented in other departments, such as 311 for general public notifications to all city departments and automating public disclosure requests. 311 will allow Public Works to utilize a work order system within our department. Standard response times will be implemented to ensure that we are communicating and handling service requests promptly.

2. Active Developments:

Minute Notes: Chris Farnsworth reviewed the active development map and project status list. The Planning Department is working on getting an updated development map with the numbers where it shows where each project is within the city.

There are currently 21 projects on this list. Yellow projects are in construction or complete, blue projects have civil approval but are not yet started, green projects are in civil review and orange projects are in closeout status.

3. 6-year STIP:

Minute Notes: Dom went over the Six Year Transportation Improvement Plan (STIP). This is a table and map of 22 projects. The two that are square are studies of potential future projects – the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan and the SR 410 Corridor Study. Dom explained that WSDOT has informed everyone to inflate cost estimates as they will not provide additional funding due to over cost estimates.

The city did add project #22, a sidewalk and ADA plan project. It is a pedestrian project on C Street from Jefferson to Mason and Jefferson from A St to C St for \$460k.

Carol would like Mundy Loss and 112th added to the STIP due to safety issues at that four-way stop. She realizes that is more difficult due to Pierce County being on the other side.

Kenny Arsanto is ok with adding the two on Ryan as well.

4. Complete Streets Ordinance:

Minute Notes: Complete Streets in Washington State refers to an approach that aims to create a transportation system accommodating all users. This includes pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists, and transit riders. When the City of Buckley adopts the Complete Streets Ordinance it will allow the city to apply for more funding from the Transportation Improvement Board (TIB).

5. Current Staffing Levels:

Minute Notes: Staffing levels within Public Works are low due to PFMLA leaves. Public Works anticipates 4 full-time staff potentially will be on PFMLA in the near future. Coupled with vacations this creates some difficulties in completing our daily, monthly and annual tasks in a timely manner.

6. Item: Radar Board on Ryan Road not functioning.

Minute Notes: Kenny Arsanto informed us that the speed radar board on Ryan Road is not functioning. Director Banks told him that we would look into this as it is more than likely a charging issue.

7. Item: Emergency Fire Works Ordinance

Minute Notes: Carol inquired if we were going to do an emergency fireworks ordinance. The City of Buckley currently follows Pierce County regulations regarding fireworks. Ultimately the Buckley Fire Chief will follow suit to any regulations Pierce County puts in place.

SUBJECT: City Hall Project

Purpose: The purpose of this memo is to provide an overview of the City Hall Addition and Modernization project for Councils consideration at bid award.

Background: The current City Hall is no longer functional. There is not enough space to accommodate existing staff and inadequate filing/storage space. Additionally, there are no conference or meeting rooms available. The Planning and Building Department has also outgrown its space at the multi-purpose center. The Council has previously emphasized the benefits of co-locating all administrative functions in one location, which would improve operational continuity, oversight, and accessibility for citizens when engaging with various departments.

The remodeled City Hall will add 1,919 square feet of new office area for a total of 3,826 square feet. Per the floor plan, this space will comfortably accommodate up to 18 staff members, which meets our anticipated long-term staffing needs in administration, finance, the clerk's office, and the building and planning departments. It will also provide a conference room, a multi-use front counter, and a revised entryway to better serve the community.

Timeline:

- **October 11, 2022:** Council approved a contract with Gray and Osborne & Tovani-Hart to complete the design and engineering services for the City Hall Addition and Modernization Project. Estimated budget: \$1,550,000.
- **January 24, 2023:** Staff provided a revised cost estimate of \$1,637,000 to include improvements to the HVAC system, demolition, abatement of discovered wood rot, installation of a metal roof system, and construction of an asphalt parking lot and sidewalk to the back entry.

- **May 16, 2023:** Bids received for the City Hall Remodel ranged from \$1,659,198 (base) to \$2,078,778 (inclusion of metal roof & parking lot).
- **June 13, 2023:** Due to high bid amounts and space concerns, staff proposed alternatives to redesign the project to include a second addition and reject all bids. The total cost for the second addition was estimated to be \$2,657,900 - \$2,886,000.
- **August 8, 2023:** Staff presented a financing plan for the second addition and expressed concerns with the original design. The financing plan included the use of cumulative reserve funds, which must be approved by resolution.
- **August 22, 2023:** Council voted via resolution 23-10 to reject all bids for the original City Hall design. Council did not choose to use the cumulative reserve to partially fund the project and requested the project be delayed until 2024 to focus on the budget.
- **November 28, 2023:** Council approved the 2024 budget via ordinance No. 19-23. The approved budget includes \$2,657,900 for the City Hall Addition and Modernization Project
- **January 9, 2024:** Council voted to approve the engineering services proposal for phase 2 redesign with option C, which was estimated to increase the cost of the original budgeted design by \$150,000, for a total budget of \$2,807,000. The remaining \$150,000 was discussed to come out of REET dollars to be budgeted in 2025.
- **May 14, 2024:** Bid opening for the redesigned City Hall project. The engineers' estimate for the project with all alternatives was \$2,711,059, including the parking lot and metal roof. The lowest responsible bidder came in at \$2,736,553.28, including the metal roof but excluding the parking lot. This total does not include construction management which is a total of \$135,000 or the cost of the temporary construction office to house IT equipment during the construction period estimated at \$4,000.

*We have had project savings in the Foothills Trailhead Parking lot and Bevlo Street improvements this year.

In 2024 the City Council budgeted \$2,657,900 for the City Hall Addition and Remodel. This allocation included REET 307 dollars, REET investment earnings & transfers from the

utilities capital funds based on the 2023 indirect cost allocation plan (ICAP) model. Since the project will not be completed until 2025 or early 2026, the City can budget future 307 REET revenue (anticipated at \$180,000-\$200,000 annually) to close the \$219,000 budget gap between the 2024 budget amount and the estimated total project cost.

Considerations for other Capital Improvements:

Aside from City Hall- the most anticipated capital improvement in the City of Buckley is the Miller Park Project. The City is currently working towards funding Miller park using a combination of grants, city matching funds and in-kind/private donations. In 2024 the Council budgeted \$288,000 out of 307 for Miller Park which will roll over to 2025 and be used towards the required match if the City is awarded grant funds. In addition, the City will be able to use the revenue brought into 308 (anticipated at \$180,000-\$200,000 annually) and park construction which will have an ending fund balance of \$390,967 in 2024 towards the park match.

At an upcoming Council meeting, as part of the comprehensive plan update, Council will also review a proposal to adjust our park impact fees which will further support Miller Park and other new park projects throughout the City.

Next Steps & Timeline: At this time staff invites discussion and direction from the City Council.

June 11, 2024- Council review and tentative action

If approved, **Summer, 2024-** construction begins, City staff will be responsible for moving all office equipment to the storage building at the wastewater treatment plant.

Summer 2024-Winter 2025 (2026)- Construction is estimated to take 18 months. During construction, staff will relocate to the fire station & multi-purpose center, with the multi-purpose center serving as the primary front counter.

On May 14, 2024, the City of Buckley received six bids for the City Hall Addition and Modernization Project Rebid. The lowest bidder has been deemed not responsible and their bid information is not presented herein. Total Construction Cost, Base Bid plus Additive Item 1 bids ranged from \$2,736,553.28 to \$3,335,021.43. The Engineer's Estimate for Total Construction Cost, Base Bid plus Additive Item 1 was \$2,658,582.20. Each proposal was checked for correctness of extensions of the prices per unit and the total price. Six corrections were made; however, these corrections did not change the position of the low bidder.

We have provided a bid summary with this letter. The bidders and their respective bid amounts, including sales tax where applicable, are as follows:

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BUCKLEY, PIERCE COUNTY,
WASHINGTON REJECTING THE LOW BID ON THE CITY HALL ADDITION &
MODERNIZATION PROJECT REBID BECAUSE IT WASN'T SUBMITTED BY A RESPONSIBLE
BIDDER AND AWARDING THE CONTRACT TO THE SECOND LOWEST BIDDER.**

WHEREAS, on April 7, 2024, the City of Buckley issued an invitation for bids for the City Hall Addition & Modernization Project Rebid; and

WHEREAS, the bids on the project were opened on May 14, 2024, and

WHEREAS, the lowest bid was submitted by a company that under the bidding terms had to disclose that it had been subject to 186 days of liquidated damages due to untimely completion of a past project; and

WHEREAS, the company's disclosure of its liquidated damages claim led City staff to investigate prior projects constructed by the low bidder and this investigation revealed that the company had significantly exceeded its original contract time on another project, and

WHEREAS, by letter dated June 4, 2024, from the City Administrator the low bidder was advised that it didn't qualify as a responsible bidder because its failure to meet contract deadlines for two projects constituted "a pattern of failing to meet Contract Time," which disqualified it as a responsible bidder under General condition 2.01.8.3h of the contract bid terms adopted for the project; and

WHEREAS, the low bidder appealed the City's June 4, 2024, determination by letter dated June 6, 2024 and asserted that its contract delays for the liquidated damages project were due to COVID, and

WHEREAS, the June 6 letter did not address the other project identified in the City Administrator's June 4, 2024, letter; and

WHEREAS, upon further investigation the City found that for the liquidated damages project the low bidder had not applied for any change order requests or extensions on the basis of COVID delays, and

WHEREAS, as a result of the City's additional investigation, the City sent a letter dated June 13, 2024, asking the low bidder to provide information by June 18, 2024, demonstrating that the delays in the liquidated damages project were the result of COVID, and

WHEREAS, in response by email dated June 18, 2024, the low bidder submitted an email providing a timeline of the delays in the project without any supporting documentation, and

WHEREAS, upon further investigation City staff found a third project constructed by the low bidder that had been subject to significant delays beyond the initially agreed upon deadlines, and

WHEREAS, Section 2.01.8.3h of the General Conditions adopted for the City Hall Addition & Modernization Project Rebid provides that to qualify as a responsible bidder a bidder must meet the following criterion:

The Bidder shall not have had liquidated damages assessed on any projects it has completed 5 years prior to the bid submittal date that demonstrate a pattern of failing to meet Contract Time, unless there are extenuating circumstances and such circumstances are deemed acceptable to the Owner.

WHEREAS, the low bidder has not provided any documentation except an undocumented timeline proving its assertion that its delays were subject to COVID and also did not provide any requests for change orders or time extensions to the owner of the liquidated damages project based on COVID, and

WHEREAS, the lack of documentation and lack of communication associated with the liquidated damages project in conjunction with delays associated with two other projects establishes both a pattern of failing to meet Contract Time and a lack of any acceptable extenuating circumstances, and

WHEREAS, timeliness of completion is of critical importance to the City Hall Addition & Modernization Project Rebid since City employees will be displaced to difficult working conditions during project construction, and

WHEREAS, for the reasons identified in the whereas clauses above, the bid of the low bidder is rejected because the low bidder is not found to qualify as a responsible bidder and the City Hall Addition & Modernization Project Rebid will be awarded to the second low bid from Lincoln Construction Inc.,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Buckley hereby declares:

Section 1. The City Hall Addition & Modernization Project Rebid is awarded to the second lowest bidder, Lincoln Construction Inc.

Section 2. The low bid for the City Hall Addition & Modernization Project Rebid project is not found to have been submitted by a responsible bidder for the reasons identified in the Whereas clauses above, adopted by this reference. The low bid is rejected because it was not submitted by a responsible bidder. This resolution constitutes the “final determination” on responsible bidder status as referenced in Section 2.01.8.3 of the General Conditions applicable to the bids solicited for the City Hall Addition & Modernization Project Rebid project.







1 SOUTH ELEVATION

SCOPE OF WORK

CITY OF BUCKLEY CITY HALL ADDITION AND MODERNIZATION PROJECT – CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT

PROJECT OVERVIEW

The City of Buckley desires to construct City Hall improvements at 933 Main Street to include the remodel of an existing 1,907 square feet of office and an addition of 1,920 square feet of new office.

This Scope of Work includes construction management services through the construction phase of the project that was rebid in May of 2024.

Inspection for exterior and interior building components will be completed by the City's Building Official. Inspection for site work and utilities will be completed by Gray & Osborne, Inc.

More specifically, the work will include the following Tasks.

CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT TASKS

Task 1 – Construction Contract Administration

- A. Schedule and Record Job Meeting: Coordinate and conduct a Preconstruction Conference to establish administrative procedures for the project. Prepare and distribute minutes of the Preconstruction Meeting.
- B. Construction Schedule: Review and comment on the Contractor's construction schedule. Monitor the Contractor's progress in relation to the schedule. Keep the parties advised on the time limit as it relates to the performance schedule.
- C. Construction Meetings: Coordinate and conduct Construction Meetings over the duration of the construction phase. Major meeting items are to include schedule status, construction progress, construction issues, Change Order Proposals, submittals, and pay estimates. Construction Meetings will be held every 2 to 3 weeks or as needed, with a total of 15 meetings assumed.
- D. Monthly Progress Estimates: Review Contractor's monthly progress payment requests.
- E. Project Closeout: Assist the City in obtaining from the Contractor, bonds, warranties, and as-built drawings. Prepare Certificate of Completion of Public Works Project.

Task 2 – Office Engineering

- A. Review Submittals: Review material submittals for compliance with design intent and general conformity to the Contract Drawings and Specifications.
- B. Review “Or Equal” Products: Review Proposals from the Contractors to substitute an “or equal” product for a specified product based on design intent and general conformity to the Contract Drawings and Specifications.
- C. Clarify Design Intent: Respond to the Contractors’ questions and provide interpretation of the Contract Specifications and Drawings, which address and clarify design intent. Prepare supplementary sketches to clarify conditions. Maintain records of telephone meetings concerning design intent.
- D. Evaluate Change Orders: Estimate the added or reduced cost of changes during construction to be used in negotiation of Contract Change Orders. Provide engineering design for Change Orders as directed by the City. Evaluate the impact of Change Orders on the construction schedule and recommend eligible time extensions.
- E. Provide office support for field activities.
- F. Architect as Subconsultant (Tovani Hart) and second tier Subconsultants to provide support for architectural, electrical, mechanical, and structural components of project.

Task 3 – Construction Monitoring

- A. Provide intermittent inspection for the duration of the project. The Resident Inspector will keep provide daily reports, provide general paperwork, and communicate directly to the Project Manager. The Fee Proposal assumes 16 working days of inspection.
- B. Conduct Final Inspections: Assist the City in conducting Substantial Completion Inspections, issue Punchlists, review compliance, and recommend acceptance by the City.

BUDGET

The maximum amount payable to the Engineer for completion of work associated with this Scope of Work, including contingencies, salaries, overhead, direct non-salary costs, and net fee is set forth in the attached Exhibit B. This amount will not be exceeded without prior written authorization of the City.



RE: Complete Streets Ordinance

Purpose: This memo serves to inform and summarize the purposed adoption of the Complete Streets Ordinance.

Complete Streets in Washington State refers to an approach that aims to create a transportation system accommodating all users. This includes pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists, and transit riders. The state legislature passed the Complete Streets Act in 2011, encouraging local governments to adopt ordinances promoting complete streets.

Any city or county that has an adopted complete streets ordinance is eligible for Transportation Improvement Board (TIB) Complete Streets funding.

Agencies showing the practice of planning and building streets to accommodate all users, including pedestrians, access to transit, cyclists, and motorists of all ages and abilities have the opportunity to receive a Complete Streets Award.

The City of Buckley will incorporate complete streets principles into the City's Comprehensive Plan, Public Works Standards, Parks and Recreation Master Plan, Traffic Circulation Plan and other plans, manuals, rules, regulations and programs as appropriate.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BUCKLEY,
WASHINGTON, ADDING CHAPTER 13.45 COMPLETE STREETS POLICY, TO
BUCKLEY MUNICIPAL CODE TITLE 13, PUBLIC WORKS, CREATING THE
COMPLETE STREETS POLICY.**

WHEREAS, a goal of Chapter 5 of the City of Buckley Comprehensive Plan is to recognize transit, bicycling, and walking as fundamental modes of transportation of equal importance to driving; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Buckley Comprehensive plan supports multimodal transportation systems; and,

WHEREAS, the adoption of a complete streets program supports implementation of the City of Buckley's **Comprehensive Plan and specifically implements Transportation Goal T-9**; and,

WHEREAS, since 2006 the City of Buckley was completed 19 projects to improve multi-modal forms of transportation; and,

WHEREAS, since 2006 the City of Buckley has installed 14.4 miles of sidewalks, 7.1 miles of bike lanes and designated 10.6 miles of sharrows "shared" lanes throughout the City; and,

WHEREAS, the one-third of Americans that do not drive, disproportionately represented by older adults, low-income people, people with disabilities, and children, would greatly benefit from the equitable distribution of safe, alternative means of travel that will result from Complete Streets practices; and

WHEREAS, the City of Buckley wants to improve the safety of city streets, enhance the quality of life of its residents, encourage active living, and reduce traffic congestion by providing safe, convenient, and comfortable routes for travel, walking, and bicycling;

NOW THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Buckley, Washington does hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. Title 13. PUBLIC WORKS, of the Buckley Municipal Code is hereby amended to include a new Chapter 13.45, Complete Streets Policy, which reads as follows:

13.45- Complete Streets Policy.

13.45.010 Purpose.

The City of Buckley shall, to the maximum extent practical, scope, plan, design, construct, operate and maintain appropriate facilities for the safe accommodation of pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, motorists, emergency responders, freight and users of all ages and abilities in all new construction, retrofit or reconstruction projects. Through ongoing operations and maintenance, the City of Buckley shall identify cost-effective opportunities to include Complete Streets practices.

13.45.020 Complete Streets Definition.

A “complete street” is a road that is designed to be safe for drivers; bicyclists; transit vehicles and users; and pedestrians of all ages and abilities. The complete streets concept focuses not just on individual roads but on changing the decision-making process so that all users are routinely considered during the planning, designing, building and operating of all roadways.

13.45.030 Exceptions.

Facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users and/or people of all abilities are not required to be provided when:

- A. documented absence of current or future need exists;
- B. Non-motorized uses are prohibited by law;
- C. Routine maintenance of the transportation network is performed that does not change the roadway geometry or operations, such as mowing, sweeping and spot repair;
- D. The cost would be disproportionate to the current need or probable future uses;
- E. In instances where a documented exception is granted by the Public Works/City Engineer.

13.45.040 Implementation.

- A. The City of Buckley will incorporate complete streets principles into the City’s Comprehensive Plan, Public Works Standards, parks and recreation master plan, traffic circulation plan and other plans, manuals, rules, regulations and programs as appropriate.
- B. As feasible, Buckley shall incorporate "Complete Streets Infrastructure" into existing public and private streets to create a comprehensive, integrated, connected transportation network for Buckley that balances access, mobility, health and safety needs of pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users, motorists, emergency responders, freight and users of all ages and abilities, ensuring a fully sustainable connected, integrated network that provides transportation options.

"Complete Streets Infrastructure" means design features that contribute to a safe, convenient, or comfortable travel experience for Users, including but not limited to features such as: sidewalks; shared use paths; bicycle lanes; automobile lanes; paved

shoulders; curbs; accessible curb ramps; bulb outs; crosswalks; refuge islands; pedestrian and traffic signals; signage; street lighting, street furniture; bicycle parking facilities; public transportation stops and facilities and traffic calming devices.

C. Complete streets may be achieved through single projects or incrementally through a series of smaller improvements or maintenance activities over time. All sources of transportation funding should be drawn upon to implement complete streets. Maximum financial flexibility is important to implement complete streets principles.

13.45.050 Intergovernmental Cooperation.

The City will cooperate with other transportation agencies including Washington State Department of Transportation, Pierce County and adjoining cities to ensure the principles and practices of complete streets are embedded within their planning, design, construction, and maintenance activities. The City will specifically cooperate to ensure the transportation network flows seamlessly between jurisdictions in accordance with local and regional road, transit, bicycle and pedestrian plans.

13.45.060 Best Practice Criteria.

The Public Works Director or designee shall modify, develop and adopt policies, design criteria, standards and guidelines based upon recognized best practices in street design, construction, and operations including but not limited to the latest editions of American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials (AASHTO), Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) and National Association of Town Transportation Officials (NACTO) while reflecting the context and character of the surrounding built and natural environments and enhance the appearance of such.

13.45.070 Performance Standards.

The City of Buckley shall put into place performance standards with measurable benchmarks to continuously evaluate the complete streets ordinance for success and opportunities for improvement. Performance standards may include transportation and mode shift, miles of bicycle facilities or sidewalks, public participation, number of ADA accommodations built, and number of exemptions from this policy approved.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days from the date of publication.
